## LOVELY MEMORIAL SERVICES AT LANGLEY BAPTIST CHURCH

Sunday afternoon Nov. 21, the Langley Baptist Church was filled with people who had come, some for many miles, to honor the life and memory of Houston Wen-dell Beard, Electrician's -Mate, first class who was killed in the battle of Salerno, Italy on September the 11th 1943. The large congregation showed the high esteen in which this brave soldier was held and also the deepest sym pathy for his parents, brothers and sisters.

A Guard of Honor arrived from Camp Gordon and stood at attention through the entire service. The Langley Choir rendered sevveral selections of music which were very appropriate. Pastor Mc-Graw used two passages of scripture as a basis for his Memorial Sermon. One was from John 11: 23: Jesus said unto her, "Thy brother, shall rise again." And al-so from Rev. 20: 13: "And the sea gave up the dead that were in it." Rev. McGraw paid tribute to the fact that this soldier had stood at his post of duty while in such terrible danger. He also read several letters, one from the commander of the U. S. S. Savannah, one from the Sec., of the Navy Frank Knox, and one from the Chaplain on the Savannah who officiated when the body was buried at Sea off the coasts of Malta on Sept., 21st. Mrs. L. B. Royal read a beautiful poem composed by her son who is now on duty in the Pacific.

Pastor McGraw also emphasized that regardless of how deep the water is in which human beings are buried at sea that they shall be resurrected by the power of God as easily as though they were bur-ied in the family cemetery. No kind of construction will prevent

the resurrection of the dead.
Years before Houston entered the Navy he made a public profession of his faith in Jesus, and united with the Langley Baptist Church. His paster stated: "It is upon this fact that we base our assurance that he will be re-surected with the saints." The Pastor also stated: "If the life and works of Jesus made the River of Jordan sacred then the life journeys of Paul made the waters of the Mediterranean sacred.
